So if you didn't mention drawing in line, line quality, using different thickness and weights of line, then you didn't grasp what the assignment was about






LINE QUALITY THE THICKNESS OR WEIGHT OF THE LINE









HATCHING Shading with lines that all go in the same direction.




CROSS HATCHING Shading with lines that go in two or more different directions.






TWO EXAMPLES OF VALUE SCALES





STIPPLING Shading with varying densities of dots.















SCRIBBLING







WELCOME TO STEP TWO OF YOUR PROJECT!

It will be an observational drawing.

It will include the use of line and value!

It will be done in pencil only.

You will have 3 class periods to work on it.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW...

- You will recreate your observational line drawing
- You will use a variety of line and mark making to show difference surfaces
- Other factors are involved, but to have a chance at an "A" you will need to use 4-5 different ways to create value in a meaningful way
- A chance for a "B" you will use at least 3 ways to create value in a meaningful way
- A chance for a "C" you will use at least 2 ways to create value in a meaningful way

WHAT ELSE WILL YOU BE LOOKING AT?

- Is your drawing accurate to what is being observed?
- Are you using the Elements of Art and Principles of Design in ways to make your piece engaging?
- Are you using a wide range of values?
- Is the composition interesting?
- Do your lines vary? Are you exploring line quality?
